Kivvun La'Atid: Mount Zion 2040

The strategic plan is almost done; now the exciting work really begins!







In March, the 35 members of the Kivvun Task Force invited input from the entire congregation on a draft final vision and strategic plan for Mount Zion. Hundreds of people offered their ideas in interactive in-person and online Future Fairs/Town Hall meetings and through a survey. All the input was read, categorized, and synthesized. Many of the ideas were about programs desired and these have been kept for the implementation stage.

A draft will be shared with the congregation at the Annual Meeting on May 12 (see p. 8) and by email/mail before the Board votes on it in June. Everyone is invited to learn about the changes in the final draft at an open conversation on Monday, May 22 at Mount Zion (7 pm) in person and via zoom. There will be informal "conversation tables" with Kivvun La'Atid leaders on Sunday, May 14 at the Yom Mishpacha brunch (see p. 6) and on Friday, May 19 before and after Shabbat services.

Shabbat is always for the soul, but there is a particularly soulful atmosphere at "Shabbat for the Soul" services. It is a more contemplative worship style with the congregation sitting in the round. We use a single page handout for the prayers. A slower pace enables us to focus on the meditative effect of the music, the potential for deeper awareness and prayer, and the feeling of community.

After a hiatus of a few years, the soundtrack to the musical *Hamilton* is once again on heavy rotation at the Strauss-Klein household. What this means is that even when it's not playing, I constantly have phrases from the show running through my head: "I am not throwing away my shot...history has its eyes on you...you will never be satisfied...look around, look around, at how lucky we are to be alive right now..."

These last two phrases caught my attention, just having read an article about happiness entitled "How to Have it All" in the most recent issue of *On Wisconsin*, the UW-Madison alumni magazine. At least in material terms, experts consider our present time to be the most conducive to happiness in human history. And yet, the phrase "you will never be satisfied" seems to apply to many Americans: satisfaction in marriages, financial situations, the government, the health care system, standard of living, and "life in general" declined across the board in the past several years. Pelin Kesebir, one of the "happiness experts" cited in the article, says "instead of looking at how much better we have made life, we wonder why life is not perfect."

To be fair, we come by this tendency honestly. As human animals we're evolutionarily primed to remember all the bad things that have ever happened to us, so we can be on guard for and size up similar scenarios to avoid getting hurt again. This is, of course, a very useful instinct in threatening situations; nonetheless, it means that being attuned to the negative comes more easily, and often criticism and judgmentalism follow rapidly.

Of course, if we focus on all that is not perfect in the world, we will never be satisfied. But *Hamilton* gives us the counterpoint to dissatisfaction as well: "look around, look around, at how lucky we are to be alive right now." From a neuroscience perspective, it is entirely our interpretive response to a stimulus that colors an experience positively or negatively, and we *can* change our brains, our perceptions, and our responses to orient to the positive.

Judaism provides us so many ways to do this, but I'll focus on one foundational concept: that Judaism is a religion of *joy*. (In fact, "Joy" recently made it into the draft for Mount Zion's Vision!) Joy is a powerful antidote to our tendency to focus on threats and lack, a reori-

enting of our propensity to evaluate and judge. Becoming aware of and naming moments of joy is a powerful way to reframe the very same world we just felt so irritated with/dissatisfied by/afraid of.

One of my favorite books is Jewish Spiritual Parenting by Rabbi Paul Kipnes and Michelle November. In Chapter 11, entitled "Living Joyfully: Finding Simcha at the Center of Life," they cite Avot D'Rabbi Natan 34:10, a minor tractate of the Talmud, which lists ten Hebrew words used to describe joy. They add four more, each of which illuminates another facet of joy: Simcha -considered the broadest word for joy, it also notes complete happiness in its fullest sense; Chedva -pure and unfiltered, expressing the happiness of being with others; Ditza-awe-inspiring, related to dancing; Gila-a stronger sensation that bursts forth but is more transient and worldly (related to gal, meaning "wave"); *Hana'a*—enjoyment of something specific; *Nachas* -prideful joy brought on especially by our children; **Osher**-deeper, abiding, connected to a yearning for inner peace and a life of meaning; Ora-signifying both "light" and "joy," suggesting an interplay between awareness and uplift.; Pitzcha-bursting into song; Ranan -being so overcome as to cry or shout out in joy; *Rina*-related to singing and shouting, often very revitalizing; Sasson-happiness coming on unexpectedly; T'rua-joy expressed in a shout or cheer (like a shofar); Tzahala-combining both happiness and dancing.

As part of a joy-seeking practice, I would invite you to consider the following questions: What are some recent experiences or moments where you experienced joy? How did it feel in your heart? In your body? Was it private, or did you want to share it with others? What did you—or someone else—do to make that joy happen? Did any of the Jewish words for joy describe that feeling?

The next time you experience joy, practice naming and describing it. In this way, you can make a spiritual practice of highlighting your joy, living life as Judaism intended it to be lived!

siblings and I all attended religious school through confirmation. I've been in Minnesota since 1996, and like many Mount Zion families, we lurked until the beginning of religious school for our older son (2007) and have been members ever since. Both of our sons became Bar Mitzvah here and one continued through confirmation. My own involvement with the congregation has been gradual – from several years on the religious school committee, a term on the board, involvement with the dues committee, then the Executive Committee, and after leading Kivvun La'Atid as president-elect for the past 2 years, I find myself now president, prepared to serve you and the congregation as a whole.

My journey of becoming part of the Mount Zion community is, however, more complex than merely through the committee work I mention above. There have been so many components of this process, and it has evolved. I'll mention a few here, in hopes that some of this resonates. When I came to the preconsecration workshop for my older son, Judi Marshall, who was helping sign folks in, was loving and supportive when I said I didn't have a Hebrew name for my child. And when I said I couldn't possibly chant Torah at my son's bar mitzvah, because I never had before, Rabbi Spilker said, "of course you can." These moments have made a difference. I have been drawn in. And it has been the acts of many who have made me and my family feel strongly about our connection and commitment to the Mount Zion community.



Tzedek = Justice

Justice! Justice!

Tzedek Committee continues its pursuit of justice, focusing on racial justice, climate justice and the work of welcoming refugees and asylum seekers.

This spring, Tzedek members participated in the Kivvun La'Atid Task Force Town Hall/Future Fair events and heard from congregants young and not-as-young regarding their priorities for future justice initiatives. Tzedek committee members will engage with these suggestions throughout the summer as we reflect on our past work, our community priorities, and our hopes for repairing the world.

With great sadness and heartfelt gratitude for a life well-lived, we mourn the loss of our Tzedek Co-Chair, Vic Rosenthal, who passed away on March 28, 2023. Vic shaped our Tzedek efforts for years, building on his long career as Executive Director of Jewish Community Action and a lifetime of advocacy and community organizing. May his memory continue to guide and inspire us.



Racial justice is at the forefront of our Tzedek efforts.

The work we have done in support of reparations for descendants of chattel slavery continues to develop. This summer we will be reading *The Sum of Us* by Heather McGhee and will host discussions for all those interested in deepening their reflections on the destructive legacy of racism in the United States.

Small Group on Climate Action Tzedek Committee sponsored a Mount Zion Climate Action Fair: Living as If the Earth Mattered in April. We plan to continue our climate action throughout the year, encouraging individual/household changes well as congregational commitments.

In keeping with our commitment to **immigration justice**, the Tzedek Committee is excited to host a naturalization ceremony at Mount Zion on Wednesday, June 21, 10:00 a.m.

Mount Zion is also sponsoring an asylum-seeking family. Mount Zion Tzedek Committee has partnered with Gloria Dei Lutheran Church to house and help support an asylee family. During the past year, Gloria Dei transformed a classroom in their church into an efficiency apartment and welcomed a family referred to them by a local agency.

Luis, Stephanie and their young son, Sebastian, arrived in Minnesota last June after an arduous journey from Peru. The family is navigating the legal process outlined under U.S. and International Humanitarian law and Gloria Dei has secured legal representation for them.

Our goal at Mount Zion is to help support the family and their day-to-day needs. We are especially requesting Target gift cards so that the family can purchase food and household items. If you are interested in contributing, please contact Diana Dean at dianamdean@msn.com.

Mount Zion has also partnered with an interfaith coalition known as Asylum Coalition for Transition – Twin Cities (ACT-TC). This group has been supporting asylum seekers in the western suburbs and is expanding to help support a family in Saint Paul. ACT-TC is hoping for volunteers from MZ to assist a new asylum-seeking family as they settle into life in Saint Paul. Help will be needed in navigating the health care system, enrolling children in school, finding legal services, and help with acquiring basic household items.
