Letter from the Rabbi



The High Holy Days – (Re)Turning Home

Attending synagogue on the High Holy Days is like visiting a strange but magnificent city filled with historical monuments to the past and overlaid with echoes of the present. It's best to think of liturgy as art, not science. It reaches us through music and the drama we call worship.

We all need moments of deep connection. It's like a balm for the soul when it works. And we know when it does or does not.

When we enter Mount Zion for the High Holy Days, will it "work"? Will you feel connected? The word and idea of connection is the best definition of spirituality. We feel spiritual because we connect to something greater than our limited self.

At the High Holy Days, we might feel more connected because of a sense of community as a whole or to our family or a group of friends. Maybe it is to tradition!, Torah, peoplehood, or to God or perhaps God is part of all the above. I personally love chanting the Akedah (Genesis 22, the Rosh Hashanah Torah reading) which anchors me in my preparation in a way that is holy and indescribable.

When we attend services, there are alas plenty of distractions to feeling connected, whether in person or home viewing online. The temperature. The sound. Peoples' sounds around us. Many long timers will recall the years of sitting in the sanctuary or Margolis Hall and reflect on how much has changed, and how much has not. Those new to Judaism or to Mount Zion will find much novel. As one suggestion, Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi z"l had a spiritual practice whenever he attended a service. He would empty himself of any expectations. In that way he was more open to appreciating all that he experienced and feeling present. For all of us, this practice is a good path to experience true connection.

As Larry Hoffman writes above, the art of liturgy guides our worship. This is our tenth year of using Mishkan HaNefesh as our machzor (prayerbook). To appreciate the flow and majesty of this machzor, please join us on Sunday, September 10 (see page 6) for workshops to prepare for the High Holy Days and for our newest tradition of Shofar on the Roof!

On behalf of your clergy, I wish you a year that will be good in all the ways you need. As our new vision states, we want all people - including ourselves - to experience a sense of wholeness and peace, shalom. May you experience that in our sanctuary in these High Holy Days and Shabbat services to come.

During the service, we will reflect on one of the themes of the High Holy Days: CHAIM


Ultimately, we seek to be written in the Book of Life. This service will also feature recitations of poetry from the prayerbook *Mishkah HaLev* in Hebrew, English, and Spanish. The Hebrew month of Elul precedes the High Holy Days.



We move from the formality of the sanctuary to our social hall to create a more intimate service. Our singing is accompanied by violin, guitar, keyboard, and percussion. The evocative music opens our hearts and awakens our spirits.

Shabbat is always for the soul, but there is a particularly soulful atmosphere at "Shabbat for the Soul" services. It is a more contemplative worship style with the congregation sitting in the round. We use a single page handout for the prayers. A slower pace enables us to focus on the meditative effect of the music, the potential for deeper awareness and prayer, and the feeling of community.





Hiddur Tefillah

Hiddur Mitzvah is the enhancement of a Mitzvah by making it visually beautiful. In our Hiddur Tefilah services, instead of seeing the service in black and white on the pages of a book, our words of prayer are enhanced by beautiful images projected on the wall in Margolis Hall. We take time



with the prayers and the music, engaging our senses more fully than usual. We sit in rounded rows, to more fully appreciate the community around us. Our singing is accompanied by violin, guitar, keyboard, and percussion.

On June 13, 2023, Mount Zion's Board of Directors unanimously approved Mount Zion's vision, our 2040 Derech (path) towards our vision, and the four strategic directions we will move forward on that Derech. By now I hope everyone here knows all about it, but if you haven't, or you need a little reminder, you can read the whole thing on our website at mzion.org. It is profoundly inspiring, and I am deeply grateful to all

those who had a hand in creating it and bringing it to light!

Now, I'm probably not supposed to have a personal favorite strategic direction, but it likely comes as little surprise that one of them is "deepening Jewish living and learning." In this direction, we are tasked with finding "new ways to inform individual Jewish choices and enhance meaning through education and spiritual/ritual practices." In many ways, I became a cantor because this is my passion. But there have been times in my life when I myself have struggled with connecting the dots between the education, the ritual, and the meaning.

Rewind back to February 2020. That Presidents' Day weekend I attended Songleader Boot Camp (SLBC) in St. Louis, one of my "last normal moments" before Covid struck (and the last time I spent much of three days in close quarters with hundreds of people and didn't think twice about it). But at the time, I was happily overwhelmed by the opportunity to learn from so many talented musicians, clergy, and songleaders. Afterwards I sat in an airport restaurant for an hour, frantically scribbling down my thoughts and feelings about what I'd just experienced: ideas about liturgy, tefillah teachings I wanted to share with our religious school students, repertoire I was excited to introduce to the congregation. Less than a month later we had shut down for Covid, and as for innovation in services, well, services on Zoom seemed like innovation enough! But for years I had in the back of my mind the idea that I wanted to bring Eliana Light, one of the faculty at SLBC, to Mount Zion.

I went to Eliana's first session, then promptly signed up for all her subsequent sessions because she questioned the why of prayer life and ritual in a way that immediately resonated for me. Not surprisingly, in my family, we "do Jewish," we do the Shabbat blessings, we build a sukkah, we light Chanukah candles, we have a seder. But I confess that one day I found myself idly wondering if Nick and I would still do "all this stuff" once our kids were out of the house. To be fair, this scenario isn't even in the cards for almost a dozen years, but the thought still stopped me short. What did "doing Jewish" even mean for me, if even subconsciously, I felt like I was doing "all this" for my kids?

Eliana spoke directly to this. She introduced the image of Judaism as a box. A box that we, perhaps out of vague feelings of guilt or obligation, passed down to the next generation. But what was important or meaningful about the box? Well, the box itself wasn't important or meaningful. What was inside the box was supposed to be. But if the box handed down to us is empty, why do we pass it along? And how long would we continue to pass an empty box down the generations before someone noticed or cared that it was empty and stopped passing it down? This image stuck with me over the intervening years, and since then I've asked "why?" so much more: as a cantor, a parent raising Jewish children, and a Jew in the pew. Prayer

and ritual are supposed to be meaningful, "spiritual," significant...but if not, why not? What can we as clergy do to facilitate, and we as "pray-ers" do to be receptive to the experience? What meaning can we infuse into the rituals we do, and what practices can we introduce into our lives that add meaning?

I'm thrilled that Eliana is finally going to visit Mount Zion, as she has personally inspired me to do whatever I can do to put meaningful things in the box, both for myself and others, and I hope she can do the same for you. We have a very exciting "Weekend of Light" planned for Friday, December I-Sunday, December 3. There will be something for everyone! Please see page 19 for more details, put it on your calendar today, and watch your email as those dates get closer.

Finally, our High Holy Day bulletin asks the following questions as we approach the year 5784: What do you most wish to experience in your life? What will you do in this New Year to make it happen? So I invite you to ask yourself what's really, truly important to you. You may recall the ad campaign "what's in your wallet?" Well, I invite you to think about what's in the box for you, or what you could put in there. And how are you going to get there? Write it down. Join a Mussar group, commit to attending one Shabbat service a month, come to Religious School tefillah on Sundays at 11:45 before picking up your kids, listen to the High Holy Day melodies on our website. Whatever it is, my fervent hope is that it helps you along the path to experience our Mount Zion vision: "a community and a world where all people experience Shalom (wholeness and peace), Tzedek (justice), Shayachut (belonging), and Simcha (joy)." May 5784 be a year filled with all of them!

From the President



I've been president for a few months now, and members often ask me, "So, how's it going?" The short answer? It's going very well. I'll take this opportunity to highlight a handful of the positives, and reflect on changes.

Recently I dropped off items for the Women of Mount Zion annual garage sale. I was met by an enthusiastic group of hardworking volunteers

who were managing inbound items, another crew sorting and organizing, and ahead of them, a continuous flow of members pulling up to unload. It was a finely tuned operation, run by committed volunteers, and supported by community members supporting it *and* clearing out unneeded items. Happiness all around.

I've also recently had terrific conversations with members of the Caring Community Team, who are thoughtfully invigorating our ability to support one another. Their message was beautiful, focused on the double mitzvah of care. We are all part of this community, and as a community we care for each other. To ask for assistance is a mitzvah because it allows someone else to do a mitzvah by helping you. Wonderful too.

This summer our youth are attending Jewish camps in high numbers and record percentages, and our leadership has had the good fortune to visit OSRUI and Camp Butwin to see them in their camp environment. Having attended summer camp myself, I know how great it is for kids (and their parents) to experience life separately for a bit. And, of course, these camp experiences help form positive and durable Jewish identities.

On another front, our newly installed board approved the recommendations of the Kivvun Task Force. Now we begin implementing our new strategic plan, expertly led by President-Elect Jon Strauss. Jon has his hands full, as he is also leading the

development of a Mount Zion ethics policy. This is a URJ recommendation for all movement congregations, not due to any specific Mount Zion concerns. It's proactive good governance. We'll share drafts with the congregation later this year.

And we are going through some staffing changes. We are so pleased to see the energy and enthusiasm of our newcomers: Religious School Director Alisha Sawyer and Event and Engagement Coordinator Gabby Helf. Then there are the two significant departures we are anticipating in the coming months. After five years with us, first leading Congregational Engagement and most recently as Executive Director, Shai Avny will be leaving for another opportunity. And Julie Beckman, who has served invaluably in our office supporting the clergy and the whole temple, will retire after thirty-six years of service at the end of December. Their departures are hard. We will dearly miss their positive energy and remarkable expertise. We are well on our way in searching for new staff to continue the excellence that they have embodied.

At the High Holy Days—remarkably just around the corner—we will reflect on the past and future. I am optimistic about our present and our future, even at a time of change. Organizations are like people: they grow and change, as part of life. At the High Holy Days, when we return the Torah to the ark, we sing "Chadesh yameinu, k'kedem/Renew our days as of old." Even as we may long for the past, or celebrate its wonders, we continually renew our days. Mount Zion is experiencing that as well, and it is good.

The year 2023 will long be remembered as part of the Jewish people's history. The debate over democracy in the Jewish state will profoundly impact all of us.

As part of our Yom Kippur Appeal, we are inviting you to consider your largest possible investment in the people of Israel who are working for democracy, justice, and pluralism. Our new vision statement includes this support as part of our core work as a synagogue.

In June our Board of Directors passed Mount Zion's new vision and strategic plan. With gratitude and joy, the vote was unanimous. Over the last year, we listened to every comment and suggestion. This process led to hundreds of changes in the document. We kept a careful eye on consistency and believe that the result is a strong statement that will guide our coming years with direction and purpose.



Jon Strauss, President-Elect, is chairing our Implementation effort. He put together a small team to assist. They met once in August and will meet again in November to begin figuring out how to sequence the four strategic directions.

- · Focus on gratitude and seek joy even in a time of great upheaval.

Social Action Update

Tzedek = Justice

Justice! Justice!

Tzedek Committee continues its pursuit of justice, focusing on racial justice, climate justice and the work of welcoming refugees and asylum seekers.

The Tzedek Committee hosted a successful retreat this summer at the Hallie Q Brown Community center where we met with executive director, Jonathon Palmer, and heard about the Rondo neighborhood and connections between the African American and Jewish communities in Saint Paul. We spent time brainstorming and enjoying in-person interaction after many, many months of virtual meetings.



We greet the New Year with renewed energy. Tzedek Committee continues to support Saint Paul's reparations initiative. The Recovery Act Commission has been seated and will soon begin meeting to determine how reparations will be distributed. Their meetings will be open to the public. As we engage with reparations, we also continue to deepen our

understanding of racial inequities in our nation and in our immediate communities. We will be hosting book discussions of Wendell Berry's *The Hidden Wound* as part of that effort.

Under the leadership of Siana Goodwin, MZ's Climate Action Small Group has been active, building partnerships with local organizations. Members are actively planning for the year's projects and events, including fall seed-gathering from native plants and a Climate Action Fair early in 2024!

In keeping with our commitment on immigration justice, and Mount Zion's identity as a sanctuary support congregation, Mount Zion is supporting three asylum-seeking families. Tzedek committee partnered with Gloria Dei Lutheran Church to sponsor a Peruvian asylum-seeking family. The family is working with an attorney and has filed their asylum application. We have also partnered with a consortium of faith communities in the Twin Cities — Asylum Coalition for Transition – Twin Cities (ACT-TC) to help support two families. One is a family of five from Guatemala who are being housed in a duplex close to Mount Zion and the other is a group of three siblings from Egypt whose mother was awarded residency status. Tragically, the mother passed away after a struggle with cancer and we have committed to helping the siblings for the next year, two of whom are attending college while caring for the youngest who is completing high school. For current needs, please see the Tzedek Committee's Immigration Justice page on Mount Zion's website. Volunteers are welcome. Any questions or requests to volunteer can be directed to Mark Joffe at marksjoffe@gmail.com.

Tzedek Leadership team members, Diana Dean and Mark Joffe, are also actively involved with JCA's Decriminalizing Communities Campaign— advocating for increased work release opportunities for incarcerated individuals, Post-Conviction Relief for individuals at risk

of deportation due to past convictions (many as a result of plea deals made under duress), and efforts to limit local co-operation with ICE. Advocacy opportunities will be shared throughout the coming months.

In support of democracy, here and around the world, the Tzedek Committee will co-sponsor, with World Without Genocide and Russians Against War, an evening of letter-writing in support of Russian political prisoners. The event will be held at Mount Zion on October 26, 6-8 pm. Please join us. Mount Zion is also co-sponsoring a talk and discussion at Mitchell-Hamline School of Law, on November 9 (Kristallnacht) from 7-9 p.m. The talk will focus on Germany's response to genocide. Learn more about both events on page 22.

Parallel to all systems of oppression, antisemitism manifests as the dehumanization or exploitation of, or discrimination or violence against, Jewish people based on stereotypes and disinformation."

March 3: Antisemitism and Anti-Zionism

This session takes as a given that critique of Israel's government is kosher. The question is when does critique of Israel cross the line into antisemitism? There is also the question of what do we mean by Zionism and Anti-Zionism? Many people have tried to find language to define these categories. We will invite three speakers who represent three public definitions of antisemitism (IHRA, Nexus, Jerusalem) — two of which were adopted recently by the White House's National Strategy to Counter Antisemitism — to help us talk about the relationship between views about the nation-state of Israel and/or its government and antisemitism.



Voicing Propaganda to Nazi Germany:

Annemarie Hase, a German-Jewish Refugee at the BBC

Wednesday, February 14, 7:30pm at Mount Zion

During the Second World War, the BBC employed dozens of German-speaking refugees – the vast majority of them Jews – to author, edit, compose and perform German-language propaganda broadcasts to listeners in Nazi Germany. One of these improbable psychological warriors was Annemarie Hase, a seasoned stage actor who became the unnamed voice of one of the most successful characters created for the BBC German Service in the war years – Frau Wernicke. This lecture tells the story of Hase's life as a refugee in London, focusing especially on her work at the BBC. It will explore what made Hase's propaganda broadcasts so effective and how the German public responded to her return to Germany shortly after the war had ended.



Sheer Ganor is Assistant Professor of History at the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities. A historian of German-speaking Jewry and modern Germany, her work focuses on the nexus of forced migration, memory and cultural identities. She is currently working on a book manuscript titled In Scattered Formation: German-speaking Jewry in Displacement which traces

the emergence of a transnational diasporic network of Jewish refugees who escaped Nazi Germany and its annexed territories. Prior to joining the University of Minnesota. Sheer held a postdoctoral research fellowship at the German Historical Institute.
