During these late fall and early winter months we read the book of Genesis. The story of Creation. But right now, it feels we are living instead, the book of destruction. The very beginning, the first week of creation is so beautiful, so full of promise as all the wonderful things come into being. Humanity is born of the earth and of God, and blessed, and then...

We are taught that humans are created in the image of God, but it has never been made clear just what that means. To me it means that we were given ultimate potential, and the power to choose what to do with it. Just as God has the power to create and the power to destroy, so do we.

In a D'var Torah on Genesis, Rabbi Shai Held reflects on the nature of humanity, God, and technological and moral progress.^{1.} "Genesis pulls the cord at both ends. On the one hand, the Torah makes a tremendous amount of space for human initiative and achievement. On the other hand, the Torah implies that we should pay careful attention to where this story of ostensible progress ends up. Moral achievements are tenuous and tentative, always subject to setback and reversal. The Bible asks us to embrace complexity, and to reject one-dimensional understandings of human potential."

And then Held makes a bold statement: "God is anything but naive, and the Bible does not hold inane ideas about human progress or 'the inherent goodness of humanity." The Jewish view is neither that human beings are inherently good nor that we are inherently bad. The Jewish view is that human beings are inherently complicated, pulled in many directions at once, capable of breathtaking kindness as well as horrific cruelty and staggering indifference.

Jewish thought steers a course between two equally simplistic conceptions of human nature. On the one hand, it refuses to assume that people are so irredeemably sinful that we're incapable of accomplishing anything. But it just as passionately dismisses the fantasy that we are so good-natured at heart that if we just held hands and swayed lovingly, human life would be perfect, and lions and lambs would lie down together."

Held's D'var Torah on B'reishit really speaks to me as I struggle to comprehend what is going on in Israel and Gaza, and how it is being played out on the news and social media. Unlike Held's view of Torah, social media loves simplistic conceptions - It is crystal clear who is right and who is wrong. Who is the oppressor and who is the oppressed. Who is the perpetrator and who is the victim. Who shall live and who shall die...

These days I find myself longing for the old days when there were only three TV stations broadcasting the news; while we surely formed opposing opinions, we were basically working from the same facts. Today the facts I may be getting from CNN or Times of Israel, have almost nothing in common with the facts others are getting from Fox News or AI Jazeera. It is no wonder that the world makes little sense when there is so much information, misinformation, and disinformation accosting us 24/7.

Trying to figure out what is true in all of this is exhausting. I try to live with a "yes, *and*..." outlook rather than a "yes, *but*..." approach, and so while I stand firmly and deeply with Israel, I also grieve for the loss of innocent Palestinian lives. While I know with full certainty that Hamas is a terrorist organization and its acts of unspeakable violence are absolutely unjustifiable - full stop - I also know that Israel's hands are not entirely clean. And that breaks my heart.

I find some comfort in Rabbi Held's reminder that this unfathomable complexity is the price of being human. It is the shadow side of the infinite potential we have to create and to heal.

Rabbi Held concludes his D'var Torah with a nechemta - a message of hope: "Judaism's view is that we are called to be world-builders; God believes in our ability to renew ourselves, and to make real and deep contributions to bringing about a more just, decent, and Cont. on p. 6


Hiddur Tefillah

As most of you know, I've been on vocal rest for a little over a month, having had a cold and then overdoing it at the High Holy Days. So many of you have so thoughtfully reached out with messages of support, and for that, and the generous support of my friends and colleagues, I am tremendously grateful! It has not been an easy time for anyone, and it is very difficult to be separated from my

Mount Zion community during a time of such communal tribulation. I once again find myself relying on the middot (character traits) of savlanut (patience), bitachon (trust), and sh'tikah (silence). I've leaned on *savlanut* as I know my vocal cords are healing, but not at the rate I wish they would. That's where bitachon comes in: I've been told, and I trust, that this will heal in time, and I will be able to return to full capacity. In the meantime, I have learned a lot about sh'tikah in these last few weeks. I am generally following the advice of my doctors as well as Rabbi Shimon ben Gamliel in Pirkei Avot 1:17, in which he says "I have found nothing better for a person than silence." I can't say I completely agree-it's hard on a singer not to sing-and fortunately I haven't had to be completely silent, even as I am greatly limited in what I how I can use my voice. But this has caused me to be very mindful of how I do choose to use it, and what is truly worth saying. As a shlicha tzibur, a "messenger of the congregation," my voice has so often been prominent, and I hope this experience causes me to become a better listener. I thank all of you for your savlanut as I recover, and I look forward-with bitachon-to the day when we can lift our voices together again!

From the President



These are challenging times, and it is hard to know what to say. I would like to offer wise presidential words about the heinous attack by Hamas, and the ongoing crisis in the Middle East. There has been untold suffering, and our hearts are broken. I read of increased antisemitism worldwide. And it is not letting up. Every thought gives rise to another thought, and it is hard to know what to say.

So for the moment I will turn my attention to updating you on items more local to Mount Zion, knowing that we are in good hands with the wisdom of our clergy and our strength as a community. As I stated during my Rosh Hashanah address, as president I spend my time thinking about the whole of Mount Zion: our community, clergy and staff, budget, and our future. So here is a brief update on some of these items.

First - our building. Many of you have heard mention of "the boiler" and how we need to replace it. Recall that our landmark building, designed by architect Erich Mendelsohn and built in the mid-1950s, is operating with its original heating system. Much like your own home, components need to be updated from time to time, and sometimes replaced altogether. Our building is no different from your home: but it, and the cost of maintaining it, is far, far larger in scale. At a recent board meeting, Ian Ellis and Scott Miller, the cochairs of our buildings and grounds committee, presented an assessment and prioritization of a maintenance program. Near term (6-12 months) high priority items include a replacement of our HVAC controls, and intermediate term items (12-36 months) include heaters, air handlers and other components. The near-term items are around \$300,000. The longer-term estimates are 3-5 million dollars. Additionally, our roof is compromised, and we are experiencing some leaks: leaks which, like any leaks, can cause damage, and grow if not found and fixed. We are working to understand the extent of these problems and what remediation is needed. We will need to fund these critical repairs too.

As for our clergy, you have likely seen the message from Cantor Strauss-Klein reporting her need to rest her vocal chords. I know that all of you join me in wishing her a complete recovery through vocal rest, which cannot be rushed. If you are like me, you may not have initially understood that "vocal rest" means complete silence. This would be challenging under any circumstance, even more so with four children at home! So on behalf of the congregation we all extend our thanks to Nick, Henry, Ari, Zelda and Eve for their contributions too. We all pray that we will soon again be able to worship with Cantor Strauss-Klein blessing us with her exquisite gifts. And of course our especial thanks to Cantor Spilker and others for stepping in during this period.

On another front, we have a strong team working on developing an ethics policy for Mount Zion. As I mentioned in a previous bulletin, this does not flow from anything amiss. We are developing this policy at the recommendation of the URJ. The team is led by President-Elect Jon Strauss and includes board member Dick Cohen, along with Tracy Fischman, Steve Warch, Judi Orland, Rabbi Spilker and myself. We expect to share a draft with the congregation this winter to seek your feedback.

On the staffing front, we are delighted to welcome Victoria Loud as Executive Assistant and Terese McCauley as Clergy Assistant. At the same time we are saying farewell to Amy Dolney and Julie Beckman in those roles. We have noted this before but it can't be said enough that Julie's departure from Mount Zion is monumental. She started at Mount Zion when all of our clergy were still students, and before some of our staff were born! Amy and Julie are generously training Victoria and Terese on the many details that make our congregation hum. We appreciate your patience as we bring these staff on board. Of course I must mention that Larry Solomon is being the ultimate mensch in stepping out of retirement while we bridge to a new Executive Director. Varda Nauen is leading that search committee along with committee members Alison Mellin, Eric Rice, Jennifer Schneider, Robert Richman, Ian Ellis, and of course Rabbi Spilker and myself. We are excited about promising candidates.

In sum, there is much in process. And much of it is challenging. I will keep you posted, and we will sort it out. In this week's Torah portion, Parashat Vayishlach, Jacob wrestled with angels during a challenging time, and prevailed. We are doing the same.

compassionate world. [And] we are all also asked to live with our eyes open, in full view of just how complicated both we and the world are. We can and must improve ourselves; but we cannot perfect ourselves. We can and must improve the world, but we cannot perfect it. That's part of what it means to wait for the messiah rather than pretend that we are the messiah. But waiting for the messiah is not an excuse for fatalism or despair. On the contrary, we wait by working, and building, and dedicating our lives to causes and realities greater than ourselves."

I hope and I pray for an end to this nightmare and a beginning of healing. Until then we can take care of one another in our complexity, in our clarity and our confusion, in our pain and in our hopes. We can pose honest questions to the news and to each other, and listen openly to the many truths around us, while trying to weed out the many falsehoods. We can try to live with our eyes and our hearts open, and believe in our ability to renew ourselves, and make real and deep contributions to bringing about a more just, decent, and compassionate world."

Our Old Sign



This sign was put up on our lawn in 2006. Following the 2nd Lebanon War and in the shadow of the 2nd intifada, many synagogues were putting up signs that said, "We Stand with Israel." After a process of congregational input, we decided to post a sign with the additional message: "We Pray for Peace in the Middle East." We felt the two messages were in dialectical conversation. We didn't have a process to determine how long the sign would stand. In the summer of 2021, about 100 congregants engaged in one or more classes and conversations facilitated by <u>Resetting the Table</u> to consider next steps.

Our New Sign



After congregational input including two Town Hall meetings, the Board voted in Spring of 2022 to approve the current sign which also welcomes all to Mount Zion. The Torah text is still in dialogue with Israel. The full text of Deuteronomy 16:20: "Justice, justice shall you pursue, that you may thrive and occupy the land that Adonai your God is giving you."

During the process, congregants advocated for different messages. We share a couple here to reflect some of the diversity of views in our community and invite you to engage in dialogue with each other.

- We Pray for Justice and Peace for Israelis and Palestinians
- We Stand with Israel, the Eternal and Democratic Nation of the Jewish People

During this challenging moment during the Israel-Hamas War, please take time to be informed, to listen to others, to stay in relationship with friends, congregants, and co-workers who see the situation differently, and to not hold anyone to the first thing that they say. And take care of yourself.

February II: A Persian-Jewish Perspective on Antisemitism – Rabbi Tarlan Rabizadeh

Rabbi Rabizadeh is American Jewish University's VP for Jewish Engagement. As a Persian Jew in an overwhelmingly Ashkenazi community, Rabbi Rabizadeh has made it her mission to bridge the gap between the communities, encouraging learning from other traditions and cultures. a bachelor's degree in political science from Boston University and ordained at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.



March 3: Antisemitism and Anti-Zionism

This session takes as a given that critique of Israel's government is kosher. The question is when does critique of Israel cross the line into antisemitism? There is also the question of what do we mean by Zionism and Anti-Zionism? Many people have tried to find language to define these categories. We will invite three speakers who represent three public definitions of antisemitism (IHRA, Nexus, Jerusalem) — two of which were adopted recently by the White House's National Strategy to Counter Antisemitism — to help us talk about the relationship between views about the nation-state of Israel and/or its government and antisemitism.

March 10: How to be an Upstander: Responding to Antisemitism Individually and Collectively

This morning will include two tracks, one for adults and another for teens and young adults and their parents/guardians.



Voicing Propaganda to Nazi Germany: Annemarie Hase, a German-Jewish Refugee at the BBC

Wednesday, February 14, 7:30pm at Mount Zion This event is co-sponsored by Mount Zion.

During the Second World War, the BBC employed dozens of German-speaking refugees – the vast majority of them Jews – to author, edit, compose and perform German-language propaganda broadcasts to listeners in Nazi Germany. One of these improbable psychological warriors was Annemarie Hase, a seasoned stage actor who became the unnamed voice of one of the most successful characters created for the BBC German Service in the war years – Frau Wernicke. This lecture tells the story of Hase's life as a refugee in London, focusing especially on her work at the BBC. It will explore what made Hase's propaganda broadcasts so effective and how the German public responded to her return to Germany shortly after the war had ended.



Sheer Ganor is Assistant Professor of History at the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities. A historian of German-speaking Jewry and modern Germany, her work focuses on the nexus of forced migration, memory and cultural identities.

Rondo and Reparations: The Black and Jewish Communities' Histories in our Neighborhood

The neighborhoods north and south of Rondo Avenue, extending south into today's Summit-University neighborhood and north to University Avenue, were always diverse including many Jewish families. By the 1950s about 85 percent of Saint Paul's African-American population

lived in the neighborhoods. Most of the original Rondo Avenue and much of the historic Rondo neighborhood were destroyed when Interstate 94 was built in 1956. More than 600 African American families lost their homes. Numerous businesses and institutions were also lost. Reflecting on this loss, St. Paul set up the St. Paul Recovery Act Community Reparations Commission on January 4, 2023.

A native of the Washington D.C. Metro area, Jonathan Palmer was born into a family committed to public service and politics. Jonathan's long biography of service, writings, and awards includes most recently serving as Executive Director of the Hallie Q. Brown Community Center for the past fifteen years.
