Rabbi Spilker's Annual Meeting D'var Torah



These remarks were delivered at the Annual Meeting on May 10, 2019.

There is a crazy but beautiful story in the Talmud of Moses encountering God affixing crowns to the letters of the Torah. When Moses asks why God would be doing such a thing, he is told that the crowns would provide a guide to future generations to connect new teachings and laws to Moses at Sinai. Even the new would be faithfully connected to the past.

Moses doesn't get it.

So, God sends Moses into the future, into the academy of Rabbi Akiva. To do so God instructs Moses to turn back around to see what would happen in the future. Moses אחור לאחור turns back to look forward and finds himself in the class of Rabbi Akiva who is teaching the class how to interpret those crowns in the Torah in extraordinary and innovative ways. Akiva ends his teaching by saying, "This I learned from Moses my teacher." (Talmud, Menuchot 29b). What is innovative in Judaism is connected authentically to the past.

Think about "turning back to look into the future" as Moses did. Professor Eugene Mihaly teaches that it is, of course, only by our turning around behind us that we can fully and most faithfully look ahead to develop a vision for the future. And we must do so even if that vision represents, as it must at certain times, a significant break from how we have always done things.

Any vision and planning for the future depends on respecting and honoring the past. The new President of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Dr. Andrew Rehfeld recently taught: "The problem is that it's not always clear what we should remember and carry with us, and what we should forget and leave behind."

At Mount Zion, it is not only because we are the oldest synagogue in the Upper Midwest that we have a responsibility to honor the past. We need to strengthen time-tested ways of being as a synagogue even as we seek to engage newer generations differently.

Rabbi Sidney Schwartz was recently in the Twin Cities meeting with community leaders about his ideas of moving toward a Jewish Renaissance. He shared the themes of this renaissance, which are worthy of deeper reflection in the months to come. Tonight, I will share his top two themes briefly: I) **Authenticity**. To reach people today, we need to provide the real deal, to raise the bar, not lower it, by providing wisdom, social justice opportunities, community and multiple entry points to living a life of sacred purpose. 2) **Relationships**. It is all about *panim el panim*, face to face encounters which can be online as well as in-person. Mount Zion's own 2014 Strategic Plan is called "Strengthening Connections" which highlighted relationships as one of the cornerstones of our work building for the future. In our recent 2019 "Strengthening the Future" plan, the number one goal is this kind of engagement.

So we are already building. The boldest outcome from these strategic plans was a new position, our Congregational Engagement Director. With Shai Avny at the helm, so much is happening on multiple fronts:

- We wanted Shai to focus on MZ Connect, the new portal for engagement at Mount Zion and the most visible part of our Engagement strategy. The purpose of MZ Connect is to centralize program and engagement offerings online and facilitate in-person and online engagement. The potential of MZ Connect keeps expanding.
 - o The cornerstone initiative of MZ Connect is our new MZ Small Groups.
 - 23 groups are on the books. 19 groups are active. Over 120 different people are participating in the groups!
 - o Check out the new MZ Connect portal at mzion.org under "Connect."
- Shai has had coffee or lunch or **connected personally and in-depth with nearly 100 congregants** so far. (Please read his column on p. 9 and give him a call or email.)
- Besides several new ways of connecting from gift giving on Purim, Mishloach Manot, to Shabbat at Home to Young Adult gatherings, Shai's most significant effort was working with several super-volunteers to successfully transition Caring Community from its founder and super, super-volunteer Judi Marshall. No small feat.

Come Celebrate Mount Zion's Tzedek (Justice) Volunteers at Shabbat Services

Friday, August 23, 6:00 pm

This special Shabbat will honor and recognize the social justice efforts that you make happen across our congregation. If you have participated in any social justice work through Project HOME/June Shelter,

Women of Mount Zion Temple, Brotherhood, the Tzedek Committee, youth group, or the Religious School, we want to celebrate your important work and reflect together about what else we can do to bring about *tikkun olam* (repair of the world).





On August 10th we observe Tisha B'Av, the Ninth of Av, which commemorates the destruction of the two ancient Temples in Jerusalem. Reform Judaism has historically been ambivalent about this traditional day of mourning and fasting. Rabbi Mark Warshofsky writes: "Reform theology has not generally looked upon the

loss of the Temple and the expulsion of the people of Israel from its land as a catastrophe to be lamented by liberal Jews." Indeed, some early Reform thinkers celebrated the event, for it was at this point in Jewish history when Judaism became "portable;" we were forced to reconcile with the fact that the Temple and its sacrificial system of worship could no longer serve as our primary conduit for a relationship with God. Rather than worship being centralized in Jerusalem, in a single place, we could carry that possibility of connection with us wherever we went.

Accordingly, for many years I didn't feel much of a connection with Tisha B'Av. While I intellectually recognized that it also marks many other historical tragedies inflicted on the Jewish people, I tended to associate it more with the site of the Temple, and the seemingly constant controversy over access to the Temple Mount and Kotel. Although I immediately fell in love with Israel, my first experiences there as an adult—my Birthright trip and my year in cantorial school—served as bookends to the second intifada, and this, together with the struggle of the Women of the Wall, led me to link the Temple site with tension and violence.

I suspect that many have similar associations, or at least may find Tisha B'Av less accessible than other Jewish holy days. Nevertheless, it provides us with a powerful opportunity to delve unabashedly into our suffering, both communal and personal, and learn the power of reexperiencing the trauma of loss and the hope of renewal. The central text is the anguish-filled litany of Eicha (Lamentations). Yet this text ends with hope, words so central that they are chanted at every Torah service and throughout the High Holy Days: "Take us back, Adonai, and we shall return: renew our days as of old!"There is hope to be found after destruction, and we experience this both in ritual and the calendar as we turn from Tisha B'Av to Rosh Hashanah, the period known as the seven weeks of consolation. Once again, Judaism gives us the means of dealing with destruction, consolation, and renewal, what Rabbi Simon lacobson calls "the mystery of eternity that has held us together through centuries of upheaval." This year, if it is not already your practice, I encourage you to experience Tisha B'Av, and integrate it into your own understanding of this cycle of loss and renewal.

From the President



My name is Michael Kuhne, and I am your new president. (I'll be honest: writing that does make my knees quake just a little.)

In the two years that I have had to prepare for this role, I have been the beneficiary of some wonderful tutelage. Our previous presidents – Dan Rybeck and Susan Robiner, in particular – have been mod-

els of equanimity, thoughtfulness, and optimism. The clergy has been inspiring and supportive. The current Board – and it is a remarkably talented and thoughtful group – has been open, curious, and decisive. Watching them instills me with confidence and reminds me: I am not doing any of this by myself.

I have also had the opportunity for study with others in preparation for this role. In February of 2017, I traveled to Jerusalem - my first visit to Israel! - to study for two weeks with Reform and Progressive Jews from around the world at the Beutel Leadership Institute. We spent the first week in a classroom attached to the Hebrew Union College; the view from the window was of the Old City's Jaffa Gate. (I will forever remember morning prayers, turning to the window, seeing the sunlight reflect on the Jerusalem stone.) The second week we spent at Lotan, a Reform kibbutz in the Negev of southern Israel. Every morning before our sessions began, I would run. Whether in Jerusalem or the desert, running is such a wonderful way to see and know a place (and there's nothing quite like watching a sunrise in the Negev). Beutel provided me with a more global perspective on what Reform Judaism looks like in the 21st century.

More recently, I had the privilege of spending a long weekend at the Scheidt Seminar near Atlanta with 150 presidents or incoming presidents of Reform synagogues in North America. It was comforting to listen to my peers discussing many of the same issues that we at Mount Zion debate: membership, security, and engagement arose time and time again. Everyone was equal parts excitement and trepidation. Everyone wants to do well by their congregations. And so do I.

Two workshops, two years' worth of executive committee meetings, a couple of dozen board meetings ... I should be ready to go, right? Well, ready or not, it's happening.

I am so honored to be Mount Zion's congregation president. This synagogue has been my family's spiritual and cultural home since 1995. I have watched my three children grow up here. I have renewed marriage vows with my beloved spouse Amanda on our lovely patio — this time under a chuppah. I have cried tears both of joy and sadness on many occasions. Here. With you. At Mount Zion.

Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and actively choosing to participate in Jewish life.

Religious School News



Thank you all for another extraordinary year here at Mount Zion. Serving as your Religious School Director has been a privilege and an honor. Those of you who were at our Yom Acharon closing service saw just how many teachers, advocates, madrichim, support staff and volunteers are involved in providing formal

and informal educational opportunities to our students and their families. All told, we invited 105 individuals up to the bima to be recognized for their roles in passing our Jewish traditions *L'dor v'dor* (from generation to generation).

This year, Yom Acharon fell during the week we read the Torah portion, *B'har*, which can be found in the book of Vayikra (Leviticus), Chapter 25, Verse I to Chapter 26, Verse 2. *B'har* is Hebrew for "on the mount." We learn that on Mount Sinai, God told Moses to tell the Israelites the law of the Sabbatical year for the land. Six years you may sow your field, and in the SEVENTH year the land shall have a Sabbath of complete rest, a Sabbath of Adonai during which you shall not sow the fields or prune your vineyard.

Does this sound familiar? Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the SEVENTH day is a Sabbath to Adonai your God. This pattern of work and rest is vital for the well-being of the land, and for our own bodies, minds and souls. In Pirkei Avot (the teachings of our ances-

tors), we learn, "You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it." While we cannot desist, there is true merit in resting from time to time to regain our strength and perspective to continue our work. I like to call this period of Jewish time of rest, reJEWvenation.

And here we are concluding another year of hard work at our religious school. Over the summer, while we are scattered about at various summer camps, traveling, visiting family and friends, we will have experiences that will enhance the work we will continue together in the Jewish Year 5780.

The clergy and staff will be here at Mount Zion with hopes that you will visit from time to time; perhaps each Shabbat. We will be preparing for the upcoming school and Jewish year at a slower, more relaxing pace than during the frenetic period from Rosh HaShanah to Shavuot. We each will, in our own ways, find time to reJEW venate between today and when we assemble again for Yom Rishon (the first day of the school year), 16 Shabbatot from now. I plan to make this a **Summer of Shabbatot**, during which I will celebrate each Shabbat in a unique and holy way, and I challenge you to do the same. I have many exciting plans for reJEW venating each Shabbat. Watch Facebook and Instagram for weekly updates!

A Message from our Congregational Engagement Director



People ask me, "What do you do at MZ?" The answer, of course, is Congregational Engagement Director. "Well, what does an Engagement Director do?" My role is a fairly new one in the Jewish community. I see my position as helping members develop and implement plans and strategies to bond and build relationships through shared interests and passions, to grow and flourish through small groups initiatives, community activities, and major events.

It was very heartening to see how this topic was covered with respect, enthusiasm, and free expression.

In the next few months, I am going to be more involved in our teen programs. We, of course, all agree that they are the future of our Jewish Community and MZ. We want to create a safe and fun place for them to grow, find inspiration and, no doubt, inspire us, because they are amazing!


