Letter from the Rabbi



A congregant once came to me and asked: "Is there any way to get ready for Rosh Hashanah? I know are supposed to forgive and forget but it's hard to just suddenly do that." She had good timing, for the next day was the beginning of Elul, the last month of the Jewish calendar. Elul, which this year coincides exactly with September, is a month of special sanctity and opportunity: a time to prepare so that our soul work during the High Holy Days will be truly effective. Rabbi Yehoshua Diskin, one of the great Mussar

masters taught: "Each day during Elul let everyone sit and look into their souls and search their deeds."

On the first Shabbat of Elul, the Torah portion Shoftim begins: "You shall appoint judges and officers for yourselves in all your gates (Deut. 16:18)." Our sages interpreted the gates symbolically as referring to a person's eyes, ears, nose and mouth, advising that during Elul we are to be especially mindful of how we use these gateways to the soul. We are to use our eyes to see the best in others and the faults in ourselves, our ears to listen carefully and deeply to one another, our touch to be gentle and affectionate with one another and our environment, and our mouths to express gratitude for all our blessings.

"May the coming month [of Elul] be one of meaningful preparation and growth, that we may be inscribed and sealed for blessing in the Book of Life."

Monthly Services in Margolis Hall

Shabbat for the Soul



Shabbat is always for the soul, but there is a particularly soulful atmosphere at "Shabbat for the Soul" services. It is a more contemplative worship style with the congregation sitting in the round. We use a single page handout for the

prayers. A slower pace enables us to focus on the meditative effect of the music, the potential for deeper awareness and prayer, and the feeling of community.

Three anecdotes, in no particular order:

One: While watching the ASL interpreter at services some weeks ago, I noticed that while Cantor Spilker read a quote in Hebrew, the interpreter signed "Jewish, Jewish, Jewish" throughout the quote, resuming signing when the words returned to English. Two:

Our family has recently become enamored with the musical Hadestown, a folk opera retelling the Greek myth of Orpheus and Eurydice. After I explained the plot to our six year old, Zelda, she offered to run upstairs and grab her lewish Bible story book, where she assumed it could be found. Three: Our three year old, Eve, announced that she was "leading services," which apparently meant to her that she gathered up kids (siblings who were happy to indulge, and a few at the playground of varying levels of willingness to participate) and sang songs at them, every so often telling her "congregation" to stand up or sit down.

I was initially bemused by each of these incidents, but, since they happened in such quick succession, it got me to thinking. What if, when other people heard Hebrew, they just heard "Hebrew, Hebrew, Hebrew" instead of actual words with actual meaning, like I (mostly) do? What if, when people considered the stories of the Hebrew Bible, they had the same cultural or moral significance to their lives as those of the Greek myths? And finally, when people attend services, could it be possible that they just see people singing at them and telling them to stand up and sit down?

One could certainly laugh at these stories and make the argument that they're amusing anecdotes and nothing more, but I disagree. I distinctly remember my transition to greater understanding and appreciation of Judaism and it did not happen passively or overnight. It is magical thinking—or at least extremely optimistic—to assume that having a religious experience just "happens." A rabbi of mine once told me that no one would expect to get better at tennis—or much of anything else-without practice, but people regularly expect to have consistent religiously significant experiences with virtually no effort on our parts. I invite you, this High Holy Day season, to resolve to broaden and deepen your Jewish knowledge and experience. Commit to taking a Hebrew class. Learn more about the liturgy. Come to Torah study and delve into our rich cultural, linguistic, and moral heritage. I promise you—if you reach out, you will find a hand reaching out to grab yours. The resources are here-right here at Mount Zion-we just need you!

From the President



Remember what it is like to find a forgotten five-dollar bill in your pocket? In my first months as president, I have found some hidden gems in the pockets of Mount Zion.

- I. My favorite part of Shavuot is standing before the ark as midnight approaches, passing a Torah scroll from one person to the next, and contemplating the meaning of standing at Sinai and receiving Torah. By that time, there are about forty people remaining from the earlier service and study sessions, but for those forty, this is such a wonderful time. It is a little bit like staying to the end of an extra inning baseball game. People may leave for a variety of reasons—work the next day, a babysitter on the clock, a child that needs to get home but for those who stay, something special might unfold. If you have not participated in Shavuot, or it's been a while since you have, do so next year and look for that something special.
- 2. For seventeen years, Mount Zion has hosted Project Home for one month each year. When I first started to volunteer for Project Home, I was reluctant. What would I say or do? However, my spouse convinced me that volunteering with our children would be a good thing—and it was. For many of us, homelessness is all too easy to ignore or avoid. However, sitting with a young father or mother, many of whom are coming to Mount Zion after a long day of work, and watching them play with their children or talk about what they want to do with their lives is humbling. I was the lead for three nights in June, and I had a behind-the-scenes view of both Mount Zion volunteers and Inter-Faith Action workers. They are inspiring! Maybe you were at services on Friday, 23 August, to hear Minnesota's Housing Commissioner Jennifer Ho and to honor our volunteers. Maybe you were inspired to take action to

- eliminate homelessness. May it be so, but until it is eliminated, please consider volunteering in the future for a Project Home shift. The experience will open your eyes and heart.
- 3. It is Mount Zion's custom for most congregants to attend Friday night services. This is especially true when the Saturday morning service is not a bar or bat mitzvah. However, those Saturday morning services are a spiritual treat. One spends time in community with a small group, praying in an intimate setting and having discussions prompted by the rabbi or lay leader. Granted, I attend these smaller Saturday morning services primarily when I am chanting, so I am slightly distracted and vaguely nauseous until I have finished J Nevertheless, it is a lovely experience. Consider participating in a small Saturday morning service, and you'll appreciate the liturgy and prayer in a new way.
- 4. In April, our Board made a security decision. Beginning this past June, an off-duty police office would not be a regular feature of services and religious school. In addition to all of the other security measures that are already in place thanks to the outstanding work of our Safety Committee, we are creating the Greeter Corps, led by Dan Schibel. As the Greeter Corps takes shape, I have been performing that role on many Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. What's been gratifying is to see so many of you, exchange greetings, and often hear your thanks for me simply being there. The Greeter Corps will grow. Please take the time to exchange greetings and perhaps even join the effort!

As summer turns to autumn and we journey through the High Holy Days, may we be blessed, may our holidays be meaningful, and may we all find some spare change in our pockets.



So you've got something to throw away while at Mount Zion... how do you know where it goes? There are so many choices! **Recycling, Compost, Trash**?

Here's a quick guide to help "sort" this out:

Recycling (blue container): bottles, cans, paper, plastic containers...anything with the recycling triangle imprinted on it. That includes hot and cold drink cups unless they are designated compostable (usually has a green stripe). No straws or plastic cutlery from outside Mount Zion, please!

Composting - Organics (green container): all food waste, including meat, dairy, eggshells. All of the products that Mount Zion is providing: cups, napkins, plates, cutlery. All bathroom paper towels and tissues.

Trash (gray container): There really won't be much! Plastic straws and plastic cutlery from outside of Mount Zion go here, as well as plastic bags or plastic wrap.


We're well on our way to being "zero-waste" at Mount Zion. Thank you for doing something wonderful for the planet and teaching our children to be stewards of our resources.





Mount Zion joins Interfaith Action's monthly "Community Power-Ups"

A relatively new effort in our neighborhood – Selby/Dale in St. Paul – to provide legal education, food, and entertainment.

When: First Thursday of Every Month; 5:30 dinner, 6:30 program. **Next date, September 5.**

Where: Walker West Music Academy, 760 Selby Ave., St. Paul

Food, music, and education are the focal points of Community Power-Ups, a monthly series of free workshops hosted by Interfaith Action of Greater St. Paul held at Walker West on Selby Avenue in St. Paul.

Mount Zion Temple is partnering with the St. Paul Black Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance, St. Anthony Park United Church of Christ, and St. Matthew's Episcopal Church to support these *Community Power-Ups*. Each month, on a Thursday evening, Walker West opens its doors to local residents in need of legal education. While there they receive a hot meal, entertainment from the Twin Cities Mobile Jazz Project, and childcare. Each congregation covers the food and child care for the month they sponsor. Mount Zion's Tzedek Committee is sponsoring August and September and will sponsor additional months in the future.

The **August 8 Power-Up** focused on Criminal and Eviction Expungements: "An arrest, charge, conviction or eviction can hurt your chance at getting a job or housing. Learn how to ask the court to seal or "expunge" your court record so it doesn't show up when an employer or landlord runs a background search. Not all records can be erased, but many can." An attorney with Southern Minnesota Regional Legal Services explained one's rights and the process and how to access free legal help.

The **September 5 Power-Up** will be about Tenant Rights in the relationship between tenants and landlords.
